## College, Press To Sponsor Annual Fair

STUDENTS FROM TRI-STATE high schools will compete for wards at the Twelfth Tri-State Regional Science Fair to be sponsored by The Evansville Press and Evansville College on Saturday, March 25, 1961, according to Charles McClary, chemistry instructor.

According to Paul Winterheimer, chairman of the Science Fair, any student in grades 7-12 who resides within a 75-mile radius of Evansville and has a project that has been approved by his science instructor, may enter his project in the fair. The exhibitors may enter only one individual exhibit and there are no entry fees.

STUDENTS IN GRADES 7-9 are placed in the Junior Division. Tenth, eleventh and twelfth graders are to register in one of the four senior divisions: Division A, Physics; Division B, Biology; Division C, Chemistry; Division D, Mathematics, Astronomy, Geology, Geography, Psychology or others not named.

Two Grand Awards are available to senior division participants. They include eligibility to enter the National Science Fair with an all-expense paid trip to the 1961 N.S.F. in Kansas City, Missouri. Other awards are first award engraved cups with copies of the Handbook of Chemistry and Physics, first and second Honor Rating; ribbons in all divisions and certificates of participation to all entries.

Sophomore and junior boys have a chance to win the Navy Science Cruise Award and receive a five-day cruise on several ships at sea. Other special awards are the Director and Signet Key Science Award, the Air Force Award and the Chemistry Award which is a \$25 savings bond.

Exhibits will be shown in the Engineering-Science Building at Evansville College. The Science Fair is open to the public from 2 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. and admittance is free.
